Spring in the Cape Flats

During my April visit to Cape Town I once again went through the whole gamut of human emotion as I vividly saw broken and hurting commuities. Broken lives, broken homes and broken relationships. Is there any hope? When will life get better? Everywhere I ventured I was faced with people who were struggling. They didn't simply want help. They desperately needed help.

Each time I go to Heideveld, I hear sad and disturbing stories and this trip was no exception. Murders. Stabbings. One day an eight year old girl was cruelly raped and the following day a six year old girl suffered a similar fate. There was also a shooting in a township police station, with someone paying the ultimate price. On another occasion I found myself comforting family friends of a 14 year old boy who had been stabbed in a school playground. Tragically, he died within 24 hours. What a waste.

In all the brokenness, hearts are heavy and tears flow. But there is hope. International author Rick Warren once wrote "In God's garden of grace, even a broken tree can bear fruit." I am believing that God's garden of grace will grow in these townships.

'Out of the box' thinking puts Heideveld on the sporting map

It's been a dream of coach Mario van Neikerk that one day a soccer team of players from the townships would be represented in the top league of South Africa. But the dream doesn't end there.

Mario has always believed that soccer is a lifeline for communities that are hijacked by violence and crime. And if change is ever to come about, soccer is as likely as any other social activity to make this happen. The team that he dreams of wouldn't just play top tier football, it would operate with a depth of humilty and servanthood that you just don't see in the modern game, anywhere in the world. The team sets the standards of fair play on the pitch and are encouraged to be beacons of virtue in their township lives.

Dreams have to start somewhere. And whilst you can't just set up a team to play at the highest level, you can create a team at a lower level that has the social qualities referred to earlier. Players of Goal50 United are expected to help with charitable activities in the township as part of their commitment to the new club. On the pitch, the team has just completed its first season in the fourth tier and has done exceptionally well to meet the required standards to maintain a place in this league next season. Several clubs in Heideveld have released players with the talent, and the right attitude, to represent the township.

"We have worked really hard to 'up' our game" says coach Cody Damons, "it certainly took us a few matches to meet the higher standards of play. But as the season has progressed, it feels like we can be competitive in this league in the future. The lads have shown a maturity of attitude on the pitch - we have work to do - but our record of very few yellow cards is something that I am very proud of. Players and coaches from other clubs have quickly recognised the unique approach of Heideveld Unite and many supporters have been won over."

Cody joined Mario's soccer academy more than a decade ago. He has seen the impact of the charity first-hand. He loves his soccer, but he loves the community work and longs for the Cape Flats to become a safer place.

As well as being committed to the club's training schedule the players are expected to make a selfless contribution. Some choose to coach the younger boys in the soccer academy, others are involved in tutoring and supporting many after-school classes and clubs. Others are involved with the charity's food programme - now distributing nearly 125,000 meals each year.

So Mario continues to dream. He seldom looks back to his crazy days on the street. His modest attempts at providing a soccer school to keep boys on the 'straight and narrow' in the year 2000 were just the start. Nearly twenty years on, who would question that one day his charges will take Goal50 United to the dizzy heights of South Africa's Premier Soccer League. And in the process would we see Heideveld 'unite'.


